I am aware that very few members now ride Star Group which always clashes with the South Coast Trials but if you are not committed elsewhere please help us put on an event that we are proud to run in the RRND name.

Lastly, thank you to everyone who responded to the request to object to the Traffic Regulation Orders set to close two byways at East Horsley. This closure will be considered by the Council in December and I will let you know the outcome. In the meantime, all byway users need to exercise care following extreme action that has the potential to cause serious harm to any user, and potentially fatal injuries to horses. Last year a wire was strung across a byway near Newlands Corner. This was taken very seriously by Police and investigated thoroughly, although without result as far as I am aware. Recently a rider in that area had his front tyre punctured and the wheel locked by a crude "stinger" device made of 6" nails in a plank which was hidden in the undergrowth. It seems unbelievable that anyone can be so stupid as to leave such an item that could cause huge damage and distress to any user.

RRND South Coast Group Trial – Betchworth – Sunday 8th August 2010

RRND held their round of the South Coast Group Trials Championship at The Old Quarry, Betchworth on Sunday 8th August. We were lucky with the weather this year as although we had rain overnight on Friday and Saturday it did not affect the ground that much, owing to the weeks of dry weather we had prior to that.

Stuart Read (Whites), Bob Collins (Reds) and myself (Blues) set out the 12 sections on the Saturday and with the weather changeable we did err on the easy side, having been caught out in previous years when rain overnight had made the sections horrendous. I still had to rein in Stuart though, who wanted to route the whites up and over everything in sight!

Sunday dawned dry and bright and the car park was soon full of cars and vans and we were well organised dispatching the observers to their sections with Sandra and Bob Collins doing the signing on whilst Stuart and I checked the route marking and sections.

The trial followed the clockwise route around the quarry with most sections in areas familiar to club members. However, the Thomas family have been busy and a whole new section of banking has been cleared and a few logs and steps introduced to make for a fearsome challenge (on the whites at least). This was utilised for section 11 and certainly raised a few eyebrows when the first riders arrived, especially those on the Blue route who still had a massive climb to attempt even if it was not quite as severe as the white one! This concern proved well founded for some and a few machines (and riders) were seen to come back down to earth the way that they had come! I even saw a very nice Sherco take a bit of a tumble on the white route, resulting in it sounding a bit off 'song' for the rest of the day. I resisted the urge to point out to the young man that I had in fact cleaned the white route climb the day before, when we were setting the trial out lest he took offence and smacked me one!

Overall everyone seemed to have a good day, with no complaints and plenty of smiles around the burger stall at the end. We had lots of helpers on the day (even though I had the usual dearth of volunteers to observe before the event) and I was most grateful to all the pairs of hands who joined in with sorting the cards when we returned to the car park. As they say 'many hands make light work' and all the section cards and flags were sorted back into their bags and colours before I left for home! Brilliant! We had numerous Club members or 'friends' of the Club who did observe, so many thanks to you all – namely Steve and Julie Mimms, Trevor Howell, Alex Clarke, Mike Hammond, Brian Walpole, Derek Tickner-Wand, Dick and Malcolm Coles, Dave Charman and the Dark family (who had the pleasure of observing the infamous section 11). See the superb photo below, taken by Bob Collins, of an anonymous rider abandoning ship on the climb on the blue route, which gives you some idea of the section. Scott Dark wisely fends off the rearing Sherco whilst Steve Forrest looks as if he is pulling an invisible rope to steady the rampant steed. Yours truly is hiding behind a large leaf hoping the no-one will recognise him!



Scores were lowish on the day, with James Graham having a brilliant ride cleaning everything on the white route, apart from Section 11 on his last lap. Thomas Moss was also riding well and would have taken the win had he not had brain fade on the easy section 4 on his first lap, when he got caught in a tree and fived. The other ride of the day came from Clubman B rider Frank Puttock, who sped around on his Beta and kept a clean sheet all day. He was finishing his third lap when some of the whites were still on their first! Louise Cannom also had a good day taking the win on the Clubman A route (half red sections and half blue) beating Keith by just a solitary mark. Well done.

Once again a successful RRND event at this popular piece of land.

Inaugural London Fire Brigade Sprint Enduro

Malcolm's first enduro event on the new bike, a 2008 Yamaha YZ125, was at Four Marks, near Alton, Hampshire, where the London Fire Brigade Enduro Club had obtained permission from the ACU to stage a new type of event for the first time in the South East. On an area that sees quite a lot of general practicing and 4x4 use and which is quite tired, Chris Salt, of Docklands Riders fame, had managed to build an extreme course on LFB's behalf. The motocross track and the worst sections of the 4x4 area had been combined, and extreme obstacles including cars, tractor tyres and oil drums in various configurations had been added.



In the Clubman Class, 38 riders had two hours in the morning to set a time to put them in the top 15 who would then go on to ride two, two lap heats, gaining points dependent on position, to decide overall position. Riders could ride as much, or as little, as they wished with a place in the heats their goal.

The track was difficult, relatively dry, rutted, dusty and stony. The woods were a different story, with slippery going, and standing stagnant water in deep ruts!

Lap times were posted and the atmosphere was tense as those on the margin struggled to keep their place in the top 15 as the session drew to a close. Rain 25 minutes before the end of the session made the track lethal and it became clear that the fastest times for that qualifying session were already posted. Malcolm had secured a 6th place so was assured of a place in the heats.

The heats started with a Le Mans type start, a sprint to the bikes, start and away. That was the

theory anyway, but Malcolm's bike took three kicks to start in the first heat, and he was 12th away. Spectacular effort saw that position changed to 5th as he crossed the final line, despite the track now being very slippery and horrendous conditions in the woods.



Malcolm's second heat was even more successful. He made a brilliant start and was away in second, a position he was to maintain almost until the finish, just being pipped to the post and pushed to third. The two laps saw excellent racing and a brilliant ride on his part being pushed hard by two very experienced and capable riders who were to be placed second and third overall. You tube video shows every trick of the book being used including ramming and pushing to decide the outcome!

At the end of the day 5th overall (by one point) was an excellent result, and a format had been tested that gave excellent spectator sport and a real test of riders.

Wickham Harvest Trial - 19/09/2010

This year I played it safe, riding the normal Expert route with Scott which is still pretty tough. Chris Dark's encouraging words of 'go on ride the Elite we could do with a laugh' secured my

decision and rightly so, the Elite this year was pretty full on!

The day looked like it was starting with a bad vibe, after Scott and I managed to ride through some seriously smelly cow **** on the way to the start, covering our lovely clean bikes and clothes, luckily this wasn't the case, it just meant we had a slight pong about us for the whole day. The trial was really well laid out, and after we got over the first section jitters we settled in and started to have some fun. There were some top riders attending the trial including our recent trainer Sam Connor, which did add a little intimidation to the riding, but nothing too off putting.

On the first lap both Scott and I both dropped fives but we also had some good rides mixed in there as well. I fived a climb that I never managed to get up the last time I was there so assumed it would be the case again for the whole day, but I did manage to get up it a couple of times later which I was pretty happy about. There were a couple of tough sections including a very awkward camber route on a bank that we both struggled with, but did eventually get through for a 1 just about. I managed to stay on the bike for the rest of the day, and Scott only dropped a couple more fives, some were due to mechanical issues though so not entirely his fault!

The trial is long and set at a huge piece of land, and by the end of the day we were pretty shattered, the pit stops at section 5 where the Dark family entourage was in full effect got longer and longer as the day went on, and I think Scott's intake of doughnuts compared to my geeky energy gels was his undoing, and by the end of the day I finished up on 51 and Scott on 86. Sam Connor took the win on the Elite with an amazing display of skill, finishing up on just a single dab for the day! I didn't realise it, but I was actually riding well compared to a lot of others and my score was enough to get me third place just a few marks behind second. It was a shame that the event clashed with our Club round at Ockley, but I would recommend this event to everyone to try at least once.
