# **Club Trials - General Regulations**

Course	Club trials may be either five laps of eight sections or four laps of ten sections. In both cases there will be a break after the second lap. It is preferred that riders ride the course as laps starting at whichever section they prefer and not keep riding the same section continuously.	
General	under 18 year old riders and it is required that you sign their entry forms. Un 18s do not have personal insurance cover, only third party. For safety reasons not ride around the course alone but in small groups observing each other in sections. Always check a section is clear before entering and no practising in sections before or during the trial. If caught practising you may be disqualif Helmets are optional for adults but you are strongly advised to wear one. under 18 riders MUST wear a helmet.

# South Coast Trial 14 August 2011

Thank you to all Club members and friends who helped or observed at our round of the South Coast Group at Ockley in August. Many riders said what a good trial it was. This is in no small part due to those of you who turned out to help, so thanks once again. Full results are on the website at <u>www.rrnd.co.uk</u>. A report from Eric Clarke follows:

RRND hosted the August round of the South Coast Group Championship on Sunday 14th August at Beare Gill, near Ockley. Most members will be familiar with the ground, which we have used for several Club trials over the last couple of years and which features a small stream running through woodland with sections along the banks and in the bed of the stream. The sections are ideal for a Club trial but we were concerned that there was not really enough scope with just those sections to host a group trial standard event, especially in August with the ground being so dry.

The area south of the sections that we use (further down the stream) has always been available to us and features some deep sided banks (more like a ravine in places) and root infested climbs, but was too heavily overgrown and blocked with fallen trees and branches to be accessible enough to use in the past. However, in the week leading up to the trial a working party of Club members and associates (Stuart and Antony Read, Colin Don, Bob and Joel Collins, Jason Keen, Steve Forrest and myself) armed with chainsaws, loppers and a multitude of machetes cleared two long stretches of the stream and its surrounding banks, and opened up a complete new area with a different feel and scope to the part that we normally use.

The team also discovered two wasps nests which resulted in both Steve Forrest and Stu Read leaping about like lunatics ripping their shirts off as the angry blighters (the wasps that is) took their vengance out in their own inimitable way!! Even with these nests meaning that we could not use parts of the stream (this time) we still had cleared enough to layout 6 new challenging sections, (especially for the White route riders!).

This gave us effectively two parts of land to use for the trial and thus we ran the trial in a figure of 8 format with sections 1 to 6 using the (northern) part of the land that we have used in the past and then coming out of the woods in the middle, where we normally finish by the car park, and travelling down the lower field to the southern end where sections 7 to 12 ran back up the stream to finish up back near the start. This sounds a bit confusing but actually worked well on the day, once people had got used to the idea of where they were going!

Sunday dawned sunny and bright and even congestion caused by the 'Surrey Classic' cycle race which closed off Dorking and the A25 did not cause a problem to the intrepid RRND team. Club members and their relatives did the Club proud and Antony had signed on a full compliment of observers before even a single rider had signed on, which made our job much easier in planning who was doing what on the day.

The trial was enjoyed by just under 50 riders, which I felt was a good turnout in the current economic climate, and in the middle of the holiday season. There were plenty of noteable 'incidents' throughout the day as the stream caught out the unwary - with at least two drowned bikes and several people wet up to their middle. Gary Martin is a very good rider and yet he was caught by a seemingly innocuous drop into the stream at section three with the front wheel of the Repsol Montesa digging in as he bailed out over the handlebars in slow motion, ending up face first in the stream with the Montesa upside down, perfectly balanced on its handlebars and mudguard - still chuffing away merrily!

Section two had the white riders dropping into the stream and then immediately followed by the steep climb on the other side but with a large tree trunk on top of that (Stu Read was the evil plotter here!). I watched several very good riders drop into the stream and take ages hopping backwards and forwards trying to line up before invariably taking a dab or two to get over the tree trunk. Thomas Moss then came along, veered away from the initial drop into the stream and then launched his Gas Gas full throttle in third gear accross the gap! His rear tyre splatted onto the tree trunk on the other side and he was over - clean! He won a deserved round of applause for the ride - but I dread to think what would have been the result if it had gone wrong! Oh to be young and fearless (and talented!). Anyway, despite machine problems later on he ran out a very worthy winner of the White route by just a few marks from young Charles Courtney who is still riding a 125 and returning from a bad hand injury.

The Inter class was won by the evergreen Kevin Nolan riding his twinshock SWM - and boy can he ride it! I watched him come out of the stream at one point and do a flick turn over some tree roots - on an old SWM !!! I couldn't do it on my modern bike! He was closely followed by Phil Martin and Marcus Faulkner who both had too many dabs throughout the day to challenge Kevin.

The best section for the Inters was section 9 - manned by Team Dark - and comprised a sandy climb beside a deep dark pool of water followed by an exit from the stream over two large and awkwardly spaced roots. This section caused problems for many, including Scott Martin who ended up in the pool alongside the initial climb, up to his waist in the water with his Montesa threatening to join him!

Steve Farrell and Chris Brooks both rode the Blue route for the loss of just two marks - which was excellent, with Simon Rye just behind on four marks lost. This might lead you to think that the Blues were too easy, but everyone felt the course was just right, with the best novice - Martin Carter (out on a brand new 2012 Gas Gas) losing 39 marks!

The Red route riders had an enjoyable day with the winner being Clubman rider Russ Kenward dropping 8 marks whilst Chris Neville won the Over 60 class on 17 marks lost. Ralph Charman did well to finish as I had to spend some time with him trying to get his drowned Sherco going at the far end of the stream and in the deepest part of the gulley. The old trick of turning the bike upside down and kicking it over to get the water out, followed by draining the carb and a new plug (my best Beta spare!) eventually got him going again - and although he was soaked through he still finished the trial. A lesson for our younger riders there who seem to give up at the first hurdle! I wont say how old Ralph is other than saying he has been getting a free bus pass for years!

Everyone I spoke to said that they enjoyed the day and the chance to ride somewhere new. Two people even said that it was the best group trial that they had ridden for years! The new sections proved very popular and have given this venue a lot more variety, with lots of riders asking if we planned to run Club trials there and could they come along and ride!

All in all a successful day - and very big thank you to all who helped with the venue clearing, laying out the trial, observed, or just took down markers at the end - it certainly made running the event a lot smoother and upheld the tradition of the RRND events being one of the best organised of the year.

# Tyneham, Dorset

If anyone is ever on the Dorset coast between Lulworth Cove and Swanage and feels like some peace and quiet then Tyneham Village is definitely worth a visit. There are no shops or pubs in fact only the remains of a beautiful village which was taken over by the army six days before Christmas in 1943, for the expansion of Lulworth tank gunnery ranges.

The whole community was evacuated to other areas, the only consolation being that they had made their contribution to winning the Second World War. The evacuation was carried out in secrecy to provide thousands of acres for the training of American tank crews, who would fight in the Battle of Normandy. They were promised by Winston Churchill's War Cabinet that they could return to their homes at the end of the War but this was never honoured.

Surviving villagers campaigned for many years and eventually in 1975 the Ministry of Defence agreed that whilst they would retain the ranges, coastal paths would be opened up and public access allowed.

Today you can wander round the remains of the village where the history is told in photographs and statements from the former residents. The school house has been fully renovated and the work of the children is on display under glass on their desks. The church also has been renovated and the inside is covered wall to wall in photographs. Services are again held there on occasions.

The walk to the beach (Worbarrow Bay) is approximately 3/4 of a mile and you can also walk to the top of the cliff for fantastic views of the coastline.



The photo of the postman's motorbike and sidecar caught my eye on our recent visit together with the Dons, but it is a place we like to return to whenever we are in Dorset.
